

Kaitlin Meadows is a hospice nurse, environmentalist, story teller, artist, activist, and educator. She worked for ten years in the Anza-Borrego Desert State Park in California and completed certification programs in Archaeology and Paleontology. She moved to Tucson in 2003 and was the 2011 Arizona Site Steward Assist Regional Coordinator of the Year. Well versed in Jungian psychology, she describes herself as "retrieving, re-imagining, and re-awakening to dream, intuition, and female mysticism."



Rock Art and Archetype in the American Southwest

By studying the images etched, pecked, or painted on stone as a speculative indicator, Kaitlin Meadows will offer a discussion of how recurring images point to connections of archetypal concepts relating to the hero and his journey, the path of personal discovery, transpersonal identification with animals, plants, and celestial markers, and the intimate connection between man and nature. Not intended as a scientific study, the program will be a lively exploration of how simple universal images act as symbols that impart meaning to more complex concepts.

Friday Evening Presentation, November 9, 7pm

Spiritual Archaeology: Unearthing Your Soul's Creativity

Participants in this workshop will unearth their own personal archetypes and connect to their potential in their lives. A sacred space will be created in which to explore these symbols and their personal resonance, viewed through the art of the Ancient Peoples of the Southwest. Using materials provided by the leader, participants will create their own rustic journal for their personal "petroglyphs" and will use writing prompts to discover the archetypes and symbols at play in their lives. Participants will each contribute to a group "song line" inspired by those of aboriginal peoples. This is a four hour workshop with two hours for creativity and two hours for writing and discussion.
