The Vietnam War, campus unrest, civil rights and the assassinations of Martin Luther King and Bobby Kennedy divided America in 1968. Polarization and chaos defined the times. These are terms that might also apply to the public and political discourse in American culture today. Is there a Jungian perspective that can help us understand the current political landscape of antipathy and vitriolic punditry?
