

# **Archetypal Thin Places: Experiencing the Numinosum**"

#### Lecture and Workshop by Jerry R. Wright

There is a tectonic shift in the archetypal unconscious that is shaking of our collective foundations—individually, culturally and religiously. Carl Jung proposed that, given the poverty of modern religions, the psychological approach to religion can speak most effectively to the modern mind and ancient soul. Dr. Wright will address the signs of a new spiritual paradigm that is trying desperately to be birthed. This will involve 1) letting go of old religious attitudes, God-images, and dogma which are based on an outdated cosmology and 2) drawing on the "new ancient wisdom" found in Jung's religious psychology and ancient Celtic mythology and spirituality. Special emphasis will be given to the image of thin places and thin times, those occasions when the imaginary curtain between the visible and invisible, physical and spiritual, is experienced as thin or numinous.

Dr. Wright's workshop will explore, in greater depth, ways of cultivating a sense of the sacred in everyday life and in the practice of psychotherapy or analysis.
